Like the legendary Phoenix– Spruce Forest Artisan Village rises from the destruction of the early morning hours of April 8, 2020



In the early morning hours of Wednesday, April 8, 2020 a strong wind storm touched down in the Spruce Forest Artisan Village. Many of the old tall Norway spruce trees, estimated to be over 100 feet tall were destroyed. Tops of the trees were torn off and blown many feet

away. Several trees were uprooted. Several of the cabins in the village were damaged, some being destroyed. The House of Yoder received damage to the roof, front entrance and chimney. A total of 46 trees were removed from the Spruce Forest Artisan Village . Broadwater Tree Service. Of Grantsville, MD began cutting up and hauling out the downed trees and branches later that same day.





Over time, the debris was cleared and hauled away. And new trees planted

While The House of Yoder celebrated our 25th Anniversary in 2024, stock piles of cut timber that was reclaimed from the spruce trees which were destroyed in the April 8, 2020 wind storm, were being readied to be used in the new construction of the pavilion at the Spruce Forest Artisan Village.


tion has the finish time set for the spring, 2025.

Judy and Rod hosted July 7-13. Judy and Rod enjoyed their time hosting and hope to return.




Joyce Yoder Harter and Judy Yoder Resler


"heritage tour". The couple hosted September 22-28.


